Math Performance

25% of Alamance County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Math, below the suburban county average of 34%.



Chronic Absenteeism

34% of Alamance County students are chronically absent from school, above the suburban county average of 26%.



Reading Performance

22% of Alamance County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Reading, below the suburban county average of 30%.

How students in Alamance County traditional schools are currently

To meet state goals, each year Alamance County needs:

- 46% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 302 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 22% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading; 5,281 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 25% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 6,342 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 87% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 141 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 34% of students are chronically absent from school; 4,914 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021








