How students in Davidson County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Davidson County needs:

- 34% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 392 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 26% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 4,902 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 31% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 5,693 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 85% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 202 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 16% of students are chronically absent from school; 1,153 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021




