### **Transition to Postsecondary**

51% of Durham County seniors enroll in postsecondary within 12 months of graduation, below the urban county average of 62%



### **Math Performance**

25% of Durham County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Math, below the urban county average of 35%.



### **NC Pre-K Enrollment**

32% of Durham County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the urban county average of 40%.

Covid-19 has affected critical transition points along the education continuum.







### How students in Durham County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Durham County needs:

- 32% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 863 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 25% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 6,467 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 25% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 8,340 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 87% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 220 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 34% of students are chronically absent from school; 7,086 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021



### **Career and College Preparation**



1,866 high school students took at least one AP course (19%) versus 25% in peer counties (2021).



394 graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs (16%) versus 17% in peer counties (2021).

Students in Durham County completed 765 Career & Technical Education concentrations in 2021. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Arts, Audio/Video Technology, & Communications; Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; and Science, Technology, Engineering, & Mathematics.




