How students in Franklin County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Franklin County needs:

- 46% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 103 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 20% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 1,877 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 23% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 2,239 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 81% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 93 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 32% of students are chronically absent from school; 1,579 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021




Franklin County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 383:1 versus 362:1 in peer counties. 2021

Career and College Preparation



236 high school students took at least one AP course (9%) versus 9% in peer counties (2021).



107 graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs (19%) versus 43% in peer counties (2021).

Students in Franklin County completed 298 Career & Technical Education concentrations in 2021. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Architecture and Construction; Law, Public Safety, Corrections, & Security; and Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources.




