To meet state goals, each year Graham County needs:

- Graham County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment. (Goal: 75%).
- 17% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 280 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 14% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 359 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 92% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 3 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 16% of students are chronically absent from school; 58 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021






