FAFSA Completion

52% of Henderson County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the suburban county average of 57%.



School Counselors

Henderson County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 387:1, above the suburban county average of 336:1.



Adult Learners

20% of Henderson County adults 25-44 have some college, no degree, above the suburban county average of 17%.

To meet state goals, each year Henderson County needs:


- 49% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 125 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 33% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 2,288 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 37% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 2,811 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 92% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 29 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 17% of students are chronically absent from school; 827 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021

Career and College Preparation



426 high school students took at least one AP course (10%) versus 15% in peer counties (2021).



410 graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs (39%) versus 33% in peer counties (2021).

Students in Henderson County completed 508 Career & Technical Education concentrations in 2021. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Architecture and Construction; and Arts, Audio/Video Technology, & Communications.




