#### **Opportunity Youth**

16% of Lincoln County youth ages 16-24 are not working and not in school, above the suburban county average of 11%.



#### **FAFSA Completion**

56% of Lincoln County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the suburban county average of 57%.



#### **Math Performance**

42% of Lincoln County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Math, below the state goal of 86%.

### How students in Lincoln County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Lincoln County needs:

- 73% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 9 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 32% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 2,142 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 42% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 2,280 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 90% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 51 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 13% of students are chronically absent from school; 270 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021




## Postsecondary assets in Charlotte Prosperity Zone sub-region
