How students in Martin County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Martin County needs:

- 59% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 24 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 17% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 668 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 15% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 848 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 72% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 52 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 21% of students are chronically absent from school; 256 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021



Career and College Preparation




