How students in New Hanover County traditional schools are currently

To meet state goals, each year New Hanover County needs:

- 66% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 87 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 34% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading; 4,211 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 39% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 5,092 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 89% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 136 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 28% of students are chronically absent from school; 4,244 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021




