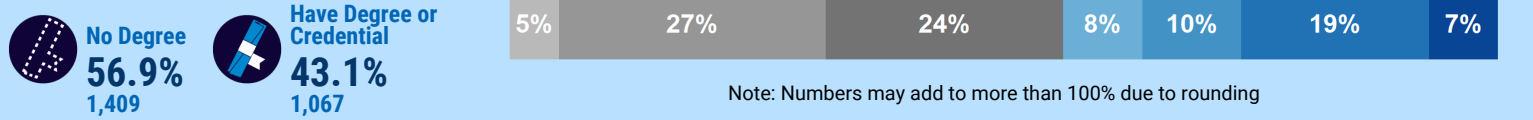

Transition to Postsecondary

37% of Perquimans County seniors enroll in postsecondary within 12 months of graduation, below the rural non-metro county average of 50%.



First-Year Persistence

64% of Perquimans County high school graduates who enroll in postsecondary persist to their second year, below the rural non-metro county average of 73%.

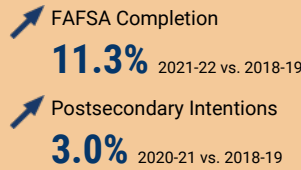
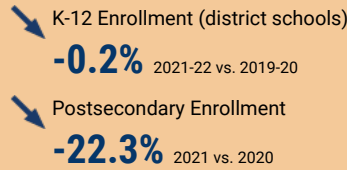


Adult Learners

ACADEMIC READINESS

How students in Perquimans County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Perquimans County needs:

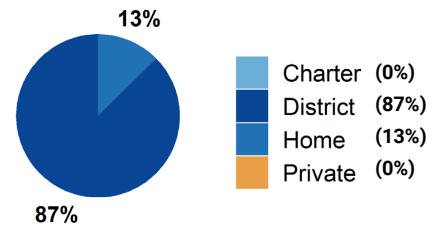
- Perquimans County has met the goal for **Pre-K enrollment**. (Goal: **75%**). 2022
- 31%** of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**; 314 more needed to meet state goal of **73%**. 2022
- 35%** of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **math**; 380 more needed to meet state goal of **86%**. 2022
- 86%** of 9th graders **graduate within four years**; 9 more needed to meet state goal of **95%**. 2021
- 30%** of students are **chronically absent from school**; 302 less needed to meet state goal of **11%**. 2021

Perquimans County has a **student-to-school counselor ratio** of 392:1 versus 318:1 in peer counties. 2021

School Choice

1,857 total students were enrolled in K-12 in Perquimans County in the 2021-22 school year.

Career and College Preparation

43 high school students took at least one **AP course** (**10%**) versus **7%** in peer counties (2021).

41 graduates participated in **Career & College Promise programs** (**47%**) versus **49%** in peer counties (2021).

Students in Perquimans County completed **100 Career & Technical Education concentrations** in 2021. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Health Science; and Law, Public Safety, Corrections, & Security.

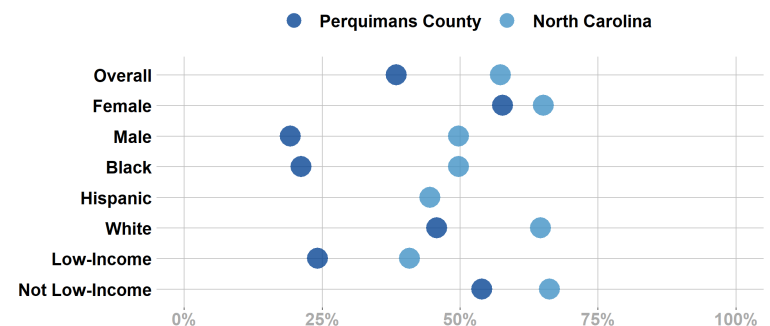
51% of seniors **completed the FAFSA** in 2022; 33 more need to complete in 2022 to meet state goal of **80%**. 2022

91% of graduates reported **intentions to enroll** in a postsecondary institution versus 69% in peer counties. 2021

37% of graduates **enrolled in a postsecondary institution** within 12 months versus 50% in peer counties. 2021

56% of Perquimans County students have **parents with no college degree** (either 2- or 4-year) versus 59% in peer counties.

Success of Perquimans County High School Graduates

Top destinations of graduates, 2016-2020

- 40% of college-goers attended a **public 4-year college**
 - 10% of college-goers attended a **private 4-year college**
 - 47% of college-goers attended a **public 2-year college**
 - <5% of college-goers attended a **private 2-year college**
 - 92% of college-goers attended an **in-state college**
- 64% of students who enroll **persist to their second year** versus 73% in peer counties. 2021
 - 49% of students who enroll **earn a degree or credential** within 6 years versus 55% in peer counties. 2021

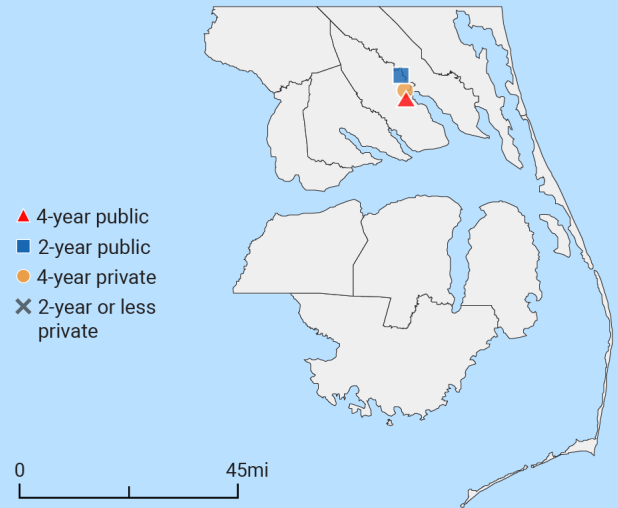

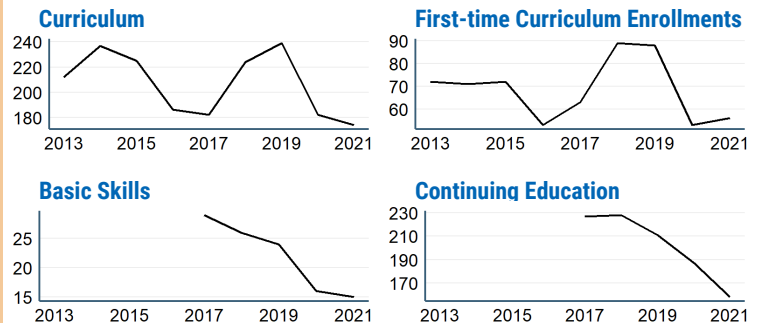
Postsecondary assets in Elizabeth City Prosperity Zone sub-region



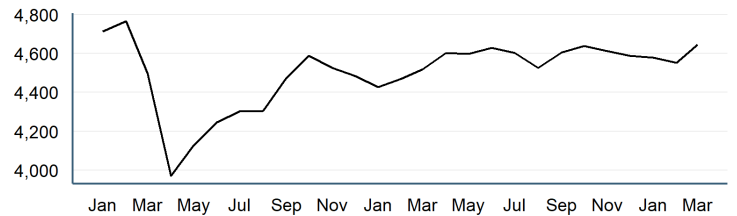
