How students in Polk County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Polk County needs:

- Polk County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment. (Goal: 75%). 2022
- 44% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading; 272 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 42% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 417 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 92% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 5 more needed to meet state goal of 95%, 2021
- 15% of students are chronically absent from school; 88 less needed to meet state goal of 11%, 2021








