How students in Sampson County traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Sampson County needs:

- 65% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 55 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 22% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading; 2,500 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 29% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 2,840 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 81% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 123 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 30% of students are chronically absent from school; 1,966 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021






