To meet state goals, each year Vance County needs:

- 59% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program; 65 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2022
- 14% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading; 1,403 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2022
- 12% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math; 1,760 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2022
- 85% of 9th graders graduate within four years; 37 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2021
- 51% of students are chronically absent from school; 1,989 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2021






