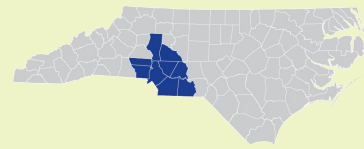

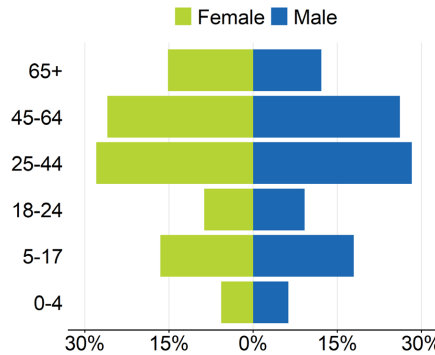

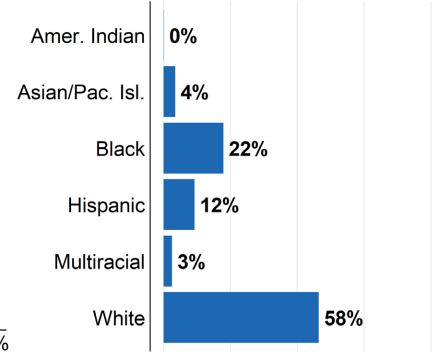

Race/Ethnicity, 2022

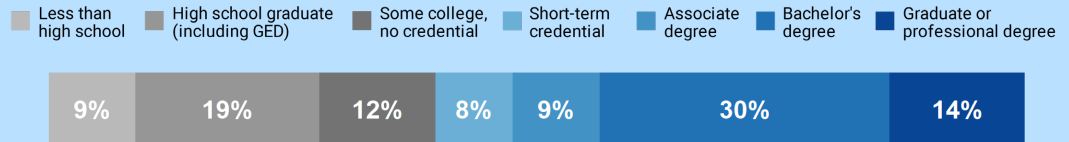

Success of Centralina Regional Council High School Graduates

- **84%** of students who enroll **persist to their second year** versus **83%** for the state. 2022
- **60%** of students who enroll **earn a degree or certificate** within 6 years versus **59%** for the state. 2022

- **24,722** of all college-goers attended **Central Piedmont CC**
- **11,283** of all college-goers attended **Rowan-Cabarrus CC**
- **8,913** of all college-goers attended **Gaston College**

- **60%** of seniors **completed the FAFSA** in 2023, compared to **62%** statewide; 4,503 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of **80%**. 2023
- **78%** of graduates reported **intentions to enroll** in a postsecondary institution versus **74%** in the state. 2022
- **59%** of graduates **enrolled in a postsecondary institution** within 12 months versus **58%** in the state. 2022

How students in Centralina Regional Council traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Centralina Regional Council needs:

- **41%** of eligible 4-year-olds **enrolled in NC Pre-K program**, compared to **53%** statewide; 3,403 more needed to meet state goal of **75%**. 2023
- **32%** of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to **30%** statewide; 60,075 more needed to meet state goal of **73%**. 2023
- **39%** of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **math**, compared to **35%** statewide; 69,026 more needed to meet state goal of **86%**. 2023
- **86%** of 9th graders **graduate within four years**, compared to **87%** statewide; 2,379 more needed to meet state goal of **95%**. 2023
- **25%** of students are **chronically absent from school**, compared to **27%** statewide; 46,334 less needed to meet state goal of **11%**. 2023
- **2%** of students **drop out of high school** (2,435 total students), compared to **2%** statewide. 2023

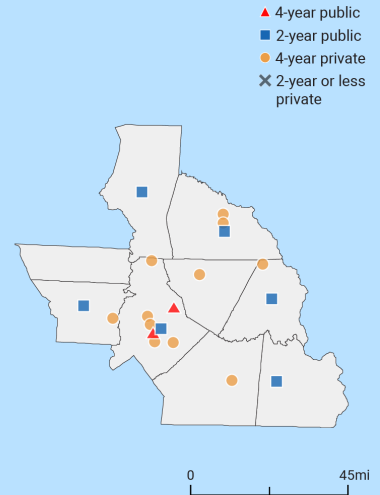

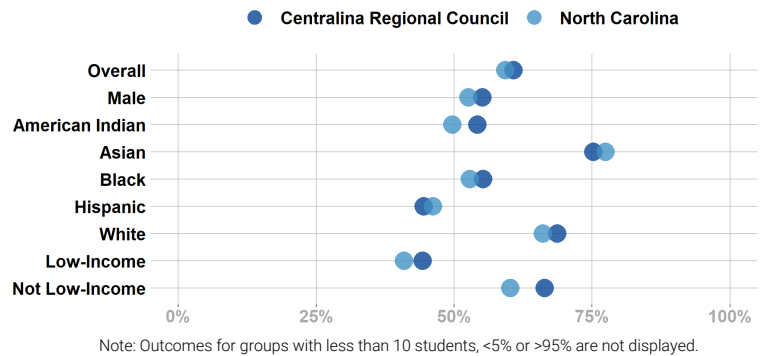

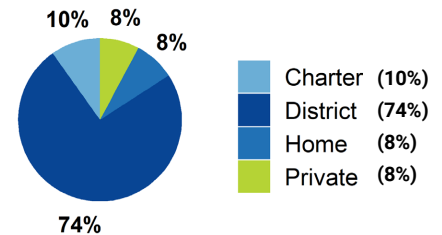
Postsecondary Enrollment Rates in Centralina Regional Council, 2022



School Choice

427,904 total students were enrolled in K-12 in Centralina Regional Council in the 2022-23 school year.

Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Centralina Regional Council completed **53,239 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials** (14,440 (27%) were industry-valued credentials) and **13,548 concentrations** in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Health Science; Hospitality & Tourism; and Human Services.

19,277 high school students took at least one **AP test (19%)** versus **16%** in the state (2023).

8,128 high school students participated in **Career & College Promise programs (34%)** versus **36%** in the state (2023).
