





- 58% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 328 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.
- 75% of graduates reported **intentions to enroll** in a postsecondary institution versus **74%** in the state. 2022

How students in Southwestern Commission traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Southwestern Commission needs:

- 62% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 117 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 30% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to 30% statewide; 4,094 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 35% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **math**, compared to **35%** statewide; 4,889 more needed to meet state goal of **86%**. 2023
- 91% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 80 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 28% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 3,911 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Southwestern Commission completed **4,773 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (1,135 (24%) were industry-valued credentials) and 1,290 concentrations** in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Health Science; and Manufacturing.



364 high school students took at least one AP test (5%) versus 16% in the state (2023).



912 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (55%) versus **36%** in the state (2023).
