









• 58% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 752 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%. 2023

• 75% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 74% in the state. 2022

#### How students in Western Piedmont traditional schools are currently doina:

To meet state goals, each year Western Piedmont needs:

· 60% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 275 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023

• 28% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 9,783 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023

• 36% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 10,902 more needed to meet state goal of 86%, 2023

• 87% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 346 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023



#### **Access to Postsecondary Credits**

Students in Western Piedmont completed 21,472 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (3,184 (15%) were industry-valued credentials) and 2,370 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Health Science; and Architecture and Construction.





1,759 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (49%) versus 36% in the state (2023).
