







Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Alleghany County completed 1,057 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (223 (21%) were industry-valued credentials) and 146 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Human Services; and Arts, Audio/Video Technology, & Communications.





POSTSECONDARY COMPLETION

How students in Alleghany County traditional schools are doing: • Alleghany County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment. (Goal: 75%). 2023

 25% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 367 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023

• 32% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 329 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023

• 87% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 9 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023

• 25% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 204 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023
