47% of Anson County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the rural - metro county average of 58%.







### How students in Anson County traditional schools are doing:

- 61% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 24 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 16% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in **reading**, compared to **30%** statewide; 959 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 15% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 966 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 77% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 36 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 48% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 1,140 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



#### **Access to Postsecondary Credits**

Students in Anson County completed 1,059 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (85 (8%) were industry-valued credentials) and 151 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Transportation, Distribution, & Logistics; Health Science; and Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources.



43 high school students took at least one AP test (5%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



80 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (44%) versus 43% in peer counties (2023).
