






48% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 48 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.

- 62% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022
- 54% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 52% in peer counties. 2022

How students in Caswell County traditional schools are doing:

- Caswell County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment. (Goal: 75%). 2023
- 19% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 650 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 17% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 675 more needed to meet state goal of 86%, 2023
- 83% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 23 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 41% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide: 685 less needed to meet state goal of 11%, 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Caswell County completed 418 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (65 (16%) were industry-valued credentials) and 80 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Manufacturing; and Human Services.



Less than 10 high school students took at least one AP test (NA) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



65 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (41%) versus 51% in peer counties (2023).
