84% of Cleveland County 9th graders complete high school in 4 years or less, below the rural - non-metro county average of 85%.


NC Community College Enrollment


58% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 205 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.

- 66% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022
- 51% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 52% in peer counties. 2022



52% of Cleveland County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 55% in peer counties.

How students in Cleveland County traditional schools are doing:

- 66% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 61 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 28% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 3,678 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 36% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 3,206 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 84% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 135 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 27% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 2,415 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Cleveland County completed 2,305 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (394 (17%) were industry-valued credentials) and 860 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Manufacturing; Human Services: and Health Science.



548 high school students took at least one AP test (12%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



542 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (53%) versus 51% in peer counties (2023).
