








First-time Curriculum Enrollments





Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Duplin County completed 3,651 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (662 (18%) were industry-valued credentials) and 644 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Health Science; and Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources.



107 high school students took at least one AP test (<5%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



300 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (47%) versus 51% in peer counties (2023).

How students in Duplin County traditional schools are doing:

- Duplin County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment. (Goal: 75%). 2023
- 17% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 3,066 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023

• 18% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 3,029 more needed to meet state goal of 86%, 2023

• 82% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 100 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023

 25% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide: 1.414 less needed to meet state goal of 11%, 2023



Duplin County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 396:1 versus 325:1 in peer counties. 2023



3% of students drop out of high school (97 total students), compared to 2% statewide. 2023


