NC Pre-K Enrollment

28% of Mecklenburg County eligible 4-yearolds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the urban county average of 41%.



High School Graduation

83% of Mecklenburg County 9th graders complete high school in 4 years or less, below the urban county average of 87%.



FAFSA Completion

61% of Mecklenburg County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the urban county average of 64%.








 61% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 1,908 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%. 2023

- 75% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 81% in peer counties. 2022
- 61% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 64% in peer counties. 2022



40% of Mecklenburg County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 37% in peer counties.

How students in Mecklenburg County traditional schools are doing:

- 28% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 2,393 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 30% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to **30%** statewide; 35,844 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 38% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 31,184 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 83% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 1,445 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 26% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 21,917 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



Mecklenburg County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 238:1 versus 286:1 in peer counties. 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Mecklenburg County completed 9,833 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (2,585 (26%) were industry-valued credentials) and 4,410 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Hospitality & Tourism; Marketing; and Health Science.



10,373 high school students took at least one AP test (23%) versus 26% in peer counties (2023).



2,223 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (22%) versus 21% in peer counties (2023).
