


57% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 160 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.

- 75% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022
- 50% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 51% in peer counties. 2022



30% of Pender County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 55% in peer counties.

How students in Pender County traditional schools are doing:

- Pender County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment. (Goal: 75%). 2023
- 33% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to **30%** statewide; 2,578 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 39% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 2,298 more needed to meet state goal of 86%, 2023
- 94% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 11 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 25% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide: 1.538 less needed to meet state goal of 11%, 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Pender County completed 5,218 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (844 (16%) were industry-valued credentials) and 584 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Health Science; Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; and Hospitality & Tourism.



359 high school students took at least one AP test (11%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



397 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (51%) versus 43% in peer counties (2023).
