



How students in Rowan County traditional schools are doing:

- 34% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 354 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 19% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 5,349 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 18% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 5,382 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 88% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 99 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 34% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 4,458 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Rowan County completed 4,544 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (573 (13%) were industry-valued credentials) and 692 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Health Science; and Human Services.



556 high school students took at least one AP test (10%) versus 15% in peer counties (2023).



431 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (31%) versus 39% in peer counties (2023).
