





- 72% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022
- 60% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 51% in peer counties. 2022



63% of Stokes County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 55% in peer counties.

How students in Stokes County traditional schools are doing:

- 68% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 15 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 28% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 1,442 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 31% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 1,363 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 89% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 27 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 22% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 657 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Stokes County completed 2,408 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (326 (14%) were industry-valued credentials) and 298 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Health Science; Human Services; and Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources.



106 high school students took at least one AP test (6%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



168 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (41%) versus 43% in peer counties (2023).
