





Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Washington County completed 471 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (104 (22%) were industry-valued credentials) and 94 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Business Management & Administration; Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; and Human Services.







• Washington County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment. (Goal: 75%). 2023

 14% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 327 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023

 20% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 303 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
