



# • 60% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 1,033 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of

- 78% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 74% in the state. 2022
- 54% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 58% in the state, 2022

# How students in Western traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Western needs:

- 54% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 596 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 32% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to **30%** statewide; 13,514 more needed to meet state goal of **73%.** 2023
- 36% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 16,418 more needed to meet state goal of 86%, 2023
- 90% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 316 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 27% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 12,445 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



# **School Choice**

102,257 total students were enrolled in K-12 in Western in the 2022-23 school year.

### **Access to Postsecondary Credits**

Students in Western completed 14,673 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (3,093 (21%) were industry-valued credentials) and 4,363 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; and Health Science.



2,613 high school students took at least one **AP test** (11%) versus 16% in the state (2023).



2,963 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (51%) versus 36% in the state (2023).
