







75.8% of adults (ages 25-44) in Graham County participated in the labor force. Peer: 78.3% | State: 84.2%, 2023






FAFSA Completion

44% of Graham County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the rural - non-metro county average of 54%.

43.7% of 2024 high school class completed the FAFSA as of Sept. 27, 2024. 26 more need to complete in 2024 to meet state goal of 80%. Peer: 54.0% | State: 55.0%


Post High School Graduation Intentions

Math Performance

17% of Graham County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Math, below the rural - non-metro county average of 30%.

Graham County has met the goal for Pre-K enrollment (Goal: 75%). Peer: 71.0% | State: 57.2% 2024

Graham County Traditional Public Schools students:

15.9% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in reading in 2024. 276 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. Peer: 24.5% | State: 29.8%

16.8% of 3-8 graders earned college-and-career-ready scores in math in 2024. 334 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. Peer: 30.3% | State: 36.5%

28.1% of students were chronically absent from school in 2024. 189 fewer needed to meet state goal of 11%. Peer: 27.7% | State: 25.7%


Graham County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 347:1 compared to 332:1 in peer counties. 2024

Pathways to College and Career

Students in traditional public schools completed 325 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials and 62 concentrations. 68 (20.9%) of credentials were industry-valued in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations: Business Management & Administration; Health Science; and Architecture and Construction.

15 (<5%) high school students took at least one AP, IB, or CIE exam. State: 16.8% (2023).

44 (56.4%) high school graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs. State: 36.0% (2024).
