



How students in Southwestern Commission traditional schools are currently doing:

To meet state goals, each year Southwestern Commission needs:

- 62% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 117 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 30% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 4,094 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 35% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 4,889 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 91% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 80 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 34% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 32% statewide; 5,132 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2022


