Top Opportunities for Growth

These three areas represent the biggest opportunities for Caldwell County to improve future attainment outcomes.



Chronic Absenteeism

40% of Caldwell County students are chronically absent from school, above the rural - metro county average of 34%.



Math Performance

28% of Caldwell County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Math, below the rural - metro county average of 30%.



Adult Learners

18% of Caldwell County adults 25-44 have some college, no degree, above the rural metro county average of 17%.







- 60% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 147 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.
- 71% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022
- 52% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 51% in peer counties. 2022



57% of Caldwell County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 57% in peer counties.

How students in Caldwell County traditional schools are doing:

- 62% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 59 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 26% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 2,799 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 28% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 2,692 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 84% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 97 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 40% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 32% statewide; 3,241 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2022



Caldwell County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 333:1 versus 362:1 in peer counties. 2022



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Caldwell County completed 6,686 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (industry-valued credential data available in Spring 2024) and 496 concentrations in 2022. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services: Health Science: and Architecture and Construction.



133 high school students took at least one AP course (<5%) versus 7% in peer counties (2022).



671 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (45%) versus 31% in peer counties (2022).
