Chronic Absenteeism

36% of Cherokee County students are chronically absent from school, above the rural - non-metro county average of 29%.



NC Pre-K Enrollment

63% of Cherokee County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the rural - nonmetro county average of 68%.



FAFSA Completion

60% of Cherokee County high school seniors complete the FAFSA, below the rural - nonmetro county average of 61%.










 60% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 42 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.

- 66% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022
- 56% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 52% in peer counties. 2022



49% of Cherokee County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 55% in peer counties.

How students in Cherokee County traditional schools are doing:

- 63% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 12 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 31% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to **30%** statewide; 742 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 35% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 687 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 92% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 8 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 36% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 805 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



Cherokee County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 251:1 versus 325:1 in peer counties. 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Cherokee County completed 1,217 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (338 (28%) were industry-valued credentials) and 143 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Business Management & Administration; and Health Science.



34 high school students took at least one AP test (<5%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



156 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (64%) versus 51% in peer counties (2023).
