NC Pre-K Enrollment

35% of Davidson County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the suburban county average of 45%.



High School Graduation

83% of Davidson County 9th graders complete high school in 4 years or less, below the suburban county average of 88%.



Reading Performance

28% of Davidson County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Reading, below the suburban county average of 31%.


NC Community College Enrollment






62% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 279 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.

- 74% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 73% in peer counties. 2022
- 55% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 57% in peer counties. 2022

- 35% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 373 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 28% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 5,983 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 35% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 5,312 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 83% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 228 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 32% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 32% statewide; 5,193 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2022







- 31% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to 30% statewide; 3,375 more needed to meet state goal of 73%, 2023
- 39% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **math**, compared to **35%** statewide; 3,777 more needed to meet state goal of **86%**. 2023



Postsecondary Enrollment Rates (within 12 months) for Select Groups in Davidson County Schools, 2022





Percentage of students enrolled in North Carolina postsecondary institution who graduate within 6 years of enrollment, 2022







Postsecondary Enrollment Rates (within 12 months) for Select Groups in Lexington City Schools, 2022








Percentage of students enrolled in North Carolina postsecondary institution who graduate within 6 years of enrollment, 2022



Postsecondary Enrollment Rates (within 12 months) for Select Groups in Thomasville City Schools, 2022




