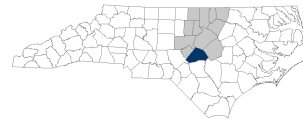

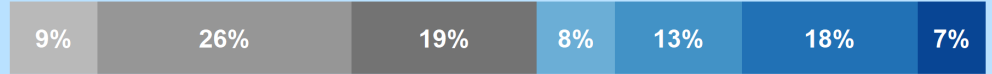

These three areas represent the biggest opportunities for Harnett County to improve future attainment outcomes.



NC Pre-K Enrollment

46% of Harnett County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the rural - metro county average of 59%.



Math Performance

23% of Harnett County 3-8 graders earn college-and-career-ready scores in Math, below the rural - metro county average of 30%.



Chronic Absenteeism

33% of Harnett County students are chronically absent from school, above the rural - metro county average of 29%.

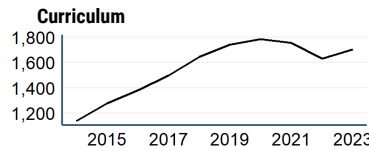

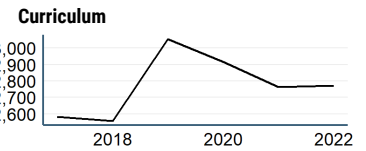

UNC System College Enrollment



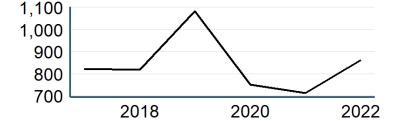
NC Community College Enrollment



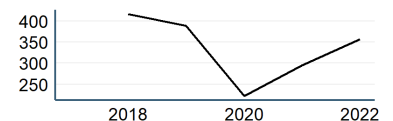

First-time Curriculum Enrollments



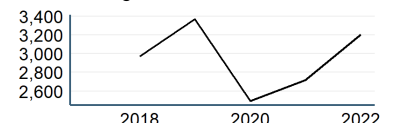

14% of Harnett County residents have student loan debt; 7% of debt holders had student loans in default. 2022

Success of Harnett County High School Graduates

- 77% of students who enroll persist to their second year versus 79% in peer counties. 2022
- 50% of students who enroll earn a degree or certificate within 6 years versus 56% in peer counties. 2022

Top destinations of all college-goers, Fall 2023

- 2,586 of all college-goers attended Central Carolina CC
- 735 of all college-goers attended Fayetteville TCC
- 610 of all college-goers attended Wake TCC

COLLEGE & CAREER ACCESS

56% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 311 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%. 2023

65% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022

50% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 51% in peer counties. 2022

50% of Harnett County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 55% in peer counties.

ACADEMIC READINESS

How students in Harnett County traditional schools are doing:

46% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 236 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023

22% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 5,819 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023

23% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 5,732 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023

87% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 130 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023

33% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 4,733 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023

Harnett County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 339:1 versus 362:1 in peer counties. 2023

2% of students drop out of high school (124 total students), compared to 2% statewide. 2023

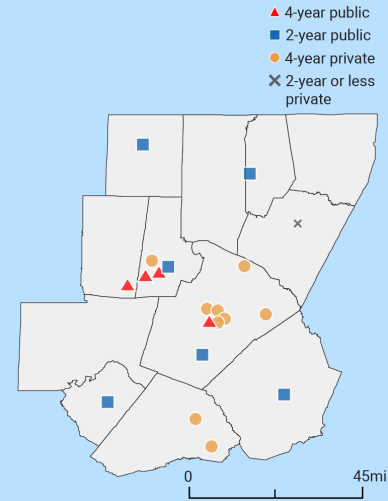

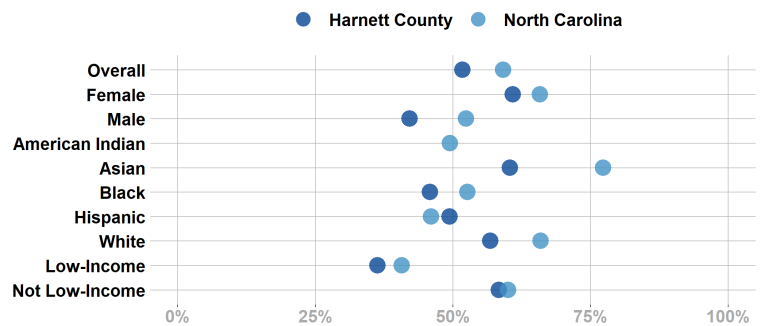

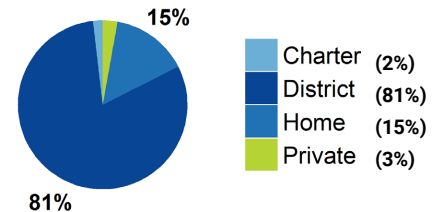
Postsecondary Enrollment Rates for Select Groups in Harnett County, 2022

24,220 total students were enrolled in K-12 in Harnett County in the 2022-23 school year.

Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Harnett County completed 8,769 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (1,143 (13%) were industry-valued credentials) and 918 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Architecture and Construction; and Health Science.

767 high school students took at least one AP test (13%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).

504 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (37%) versus 43% in peer counties (2023).
