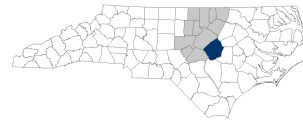

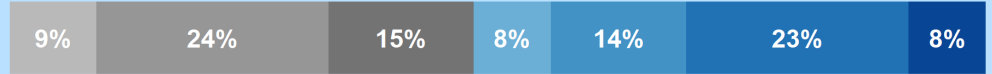

Top Opportunities for Growth

These three areas represent the biggest opportunities for Johnston County to improve future attainment outcomes.



NC Pre-K Enrollment

32% of Johnston County eligible 4-year-olds are enrolled in NC Pre-K, below the suburban county average of 45%.



Earning College Credit in High School

30% of Johnston County graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs, below the suburban county average of 39%. Also, 7% of high school students took at least one AP exam, below the peer county average of 15%.



School Counselors

Johnston County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 407:1, above the suburban county average of 327:1.

Promising Attainment Practices

The new Promising Attainment Practices Database is a curated, searchable, and filterable collection of about 250 county, region, and state-level initiatives and programs that directly address various components of the state's attainment challenge. 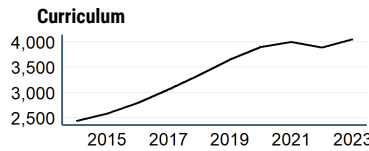

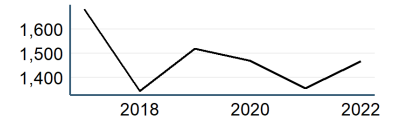

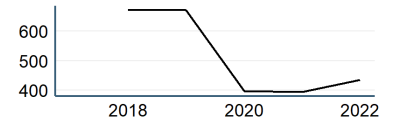

First-time Curriculum Enrollments



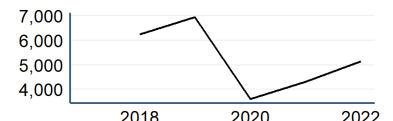

Success of Johnston County High School Graduates

- 84% of students who enroll persist to their second year versus 82% in peer counties. 2022
- 61% of students who enroll earn a degree or certificate within 6 years versus 60% in peer counties. 2022

Top destinations of all college-goers, Fall 2023

- 4,942 of all college-goers attended Johnston CC
- 1,786 of all college-goers attended Wake TCC
- 262 of all college-goers attended Wayne CC

COLLEGE & CAREER ACCESS

59% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 591 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%. 2023

72% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 73% in peer counties. 2022

56% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 57% in peer counties. 2022

50% of Johnston County students have parents with no college degree (either 2- or 4-year) versus 48% in peer counties.

ACADEMIC READINESS

How students in Johnston County traditional schools are doing:

- 32% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 417 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 30% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 9,312 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 33% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 8,859 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 92% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 106 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 23% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 4,602 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023

Johnston County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 407:1 versus 327:1 in peer counties. 2023

2% of students drop out of high school (297 total students), compared to 2% statewide. 2023

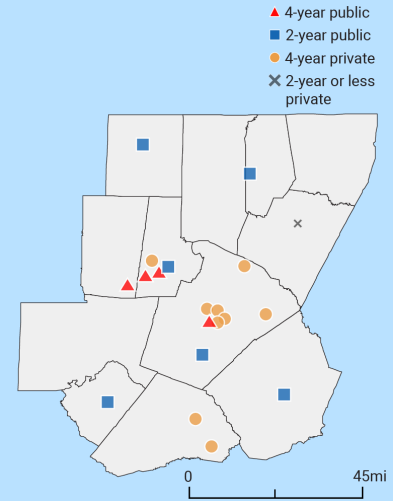

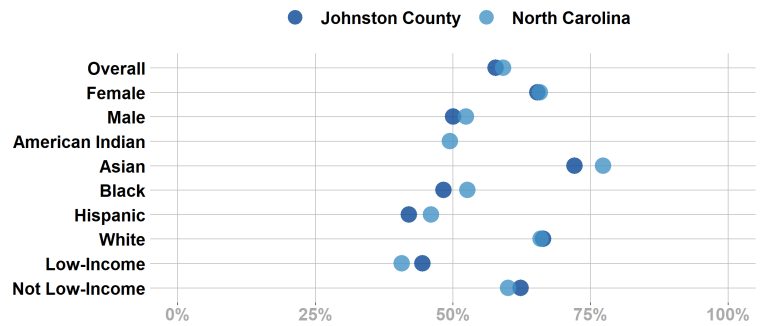

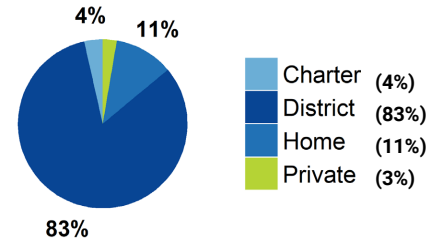
Postsecondary Enrollment Rates for Select Groups in Johnston County, 2022

School Choice

44,470 total students were enrolled in K-12 in Johnston County in the 2022-23 school year.

Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Johnston County completed 5,471 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (1,297 (24%) were industry-valued credentials) and 2,485 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Health Science; and Human Services.

853 high school students took at least one AP test (7%) versus 15% in peer counties (2023).

890 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (30%) versus 39% in peer counties (2023).
