







How students in Johnston County traditional schools are doing:

- 32% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 417 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 30% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 9,312 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 33% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 8,859 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 92% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 106 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 23% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 32% statewide; 4,689 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2022



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Johnston County completed 3,515 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (industry-valued credential data available in Spring 2024) and 1,987 concentrations in 2022. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Human Services; and Health Science.
