





- 54% of seniors completed the FAFSA in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 74 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%.
- 69% of graduates reported intentions to enroll in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022
- 52% of graduates enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 12 months versus 52% in peer counties. 2022

How students in Macon County traditional schools are doing:

- 59% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 26 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023
- 27% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 1,172 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023
- 27% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4) or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 1,180 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023
- 93% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 5 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
- 25% of students are chronically absent from school, compared to 27% statewide; 637 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Macon County completed 846 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (192 (23%) were industry-valued credentials) and 209 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; and Manufacturing.



83 high school students took at least one AP test (6%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).



206 high school students participated in Career & College Promise programs (65%) versus 51% in peer counties (2023).
