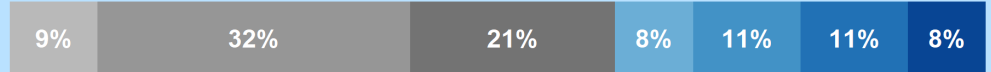

## Top Opportunities for Growth

These three areas represent the biggest opportunities for Perquimans County to improve future attainment outcomes.



### Earning College Credit in High School

31% of Perquimans County graduates participated in Career & College Promise programs, below the rural - non-metro county average of 51%. Also, <5% of high school students took at least one AP exam, below the peer county average of 8%.



### School Counselors

Perquimans County has a student-to-school counselor ratio of 406:1, above the rural - non-metro county average of 325:1.



### Adult Learners

21% of Perquimans County adults 25-44 have some college, no degree, above the rural - non-metro county average of 16%.

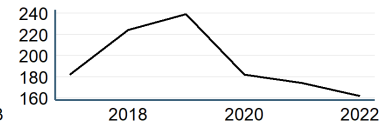

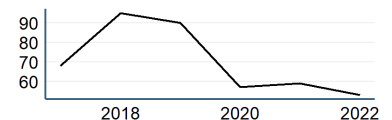

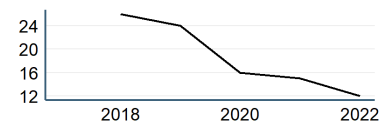

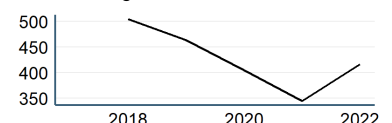
#### First-time Curriculum Enrollments

9% of Perquimans County residents have **student loan debt**; 0% of debt holders had **student loans in default**. 2022

### Success of Perquimans County High School Graduates

- 77% of students who enroll **persist to their second year** versus 78% in peer counties. 2022
- 48% of students who enroll **earn a degree or certificate** within 6 years versus 55% in peer counties. 2022

### Top destinations of all college-goers, Fall 2023

- 311 of all college-goers attended **College of The Albemarle**
- 10 of all college-goers attended **Pitt CC**
- 7 of all college-goers attended **Roanoke-Chowan CC**

64% of seniors **completed the FAFSA** in 2023, compared to 62% statewide; 18 more need to complete in 2023 to meet state goal of 80%. 2023

72% of graduates reported **intentions to enroll** in a postsecondary institution versus 68% in peer counties. 2022

35% of graduates **enrolled in a postsecondary institution** within 12 months versus 52% in peer counties. 2022

52% of Perquimans County students have **parents with no college degree** (either 2- or 4-year) versus 55% in peer counties.

### How students in Perquimans County traditional schools are doing:

Perquimans County has met the goal for **Pre-K enrollment**. (Goal: 75%). 2023

31% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **reading**, compared to 30% statewide; 421 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023

38% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in **math**, compared to 35% statewide; 364 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023

89% of 9th graders **graduate within four years**, compared to 87% statewide; 7 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023

23% of students are **chronically absent from school**, compared to 27% statewide; 206 less needed to meet state goal of 11%. 2023

Perquimans County has a **student-to-school counselor ratio** of 406:1 versus 325:1 in peer counties. 2023

0% of students **drop out of high school** (2 total students), compared to 2% statewide. 2023

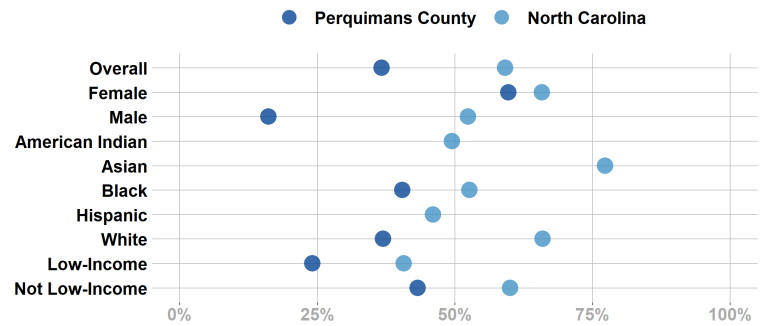

### Postsecondary Enrollment Rates for Select Groups in Perquimans County, 2022

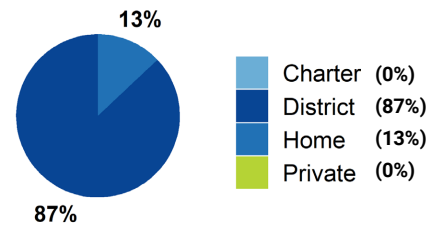

1,877 total students were enrolled in K-12 in Perquimans County in the 2022-23 school year.

### Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Perquimans County completed **436 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (30 (7%) were industry-valued credentials) and 63 concentrations** in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Law, Public Safety, Corrections, & Security; and Architecture and Construction.

14 high school students took at least one **AP test** (<5%) versus 8% in peer counties (2023).

35 high school students participated in **Career & College Promise programs (31%)** versus 51% in peer counties (2023).
