









Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Rutherford County completed 2,795 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (166 (6%) were industry-valued credentials) and 475 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; and Hospitality & Tourism.



How students in Rutherford County traditional schools are doing:

· 63% of eligible 4-year-olds enrolled in NC Pre-K program, compared to 53% statewide; 48 more needed to meet state goal of 75%. 2023

• 30% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in reading, compared to 30% statewide; 1,817 more needed to meet state goal of 73%. 2023

 33% of 3-8 graders are earning college-and-career-ready scores (level 4 or 5) in math, compared to 35% statewide; 1,703 more needed to meet state goal of 86%. 2023

• 89% of 9th graders graduate within four years, compared to 87% statewide; 36 more needed to meet state goal of 95%. 2023
