




Postsecondary Enrollment Rates for Select Groups in North Central, 2022



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in North Central completed 68,104 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (16,654 (24%) were industry-valued credentials) and 16,150 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Human Services; Health Science; and Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources.


