




Age Structure, 2022





School Choice

118.271 total students were enrolled in K-12 in Mid-Carolina in the 2022-23 school year.



Access to Postsecondary Credits

Students in Mid-Carolina completed 33,986 Career & Technical Education (CTE) credentials (5,534 (16%) were industry-valued credentials) and 5,094 concentrations in 2023. The top three CTE concentrations completed include Agricultural, Food, & Natural Resources; Health Science; and Law, Public Safety, Corrections, & Security.


